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About our language courses

Background

With the enactment of the Strategic Development Plan 2017, Rhine-Waal University of Applied Sciences made a collective decision to embed foreign language courses in the curricula of its degree programmes. In the years since, numerous degree programmes have undergone reaccreditation processes and implemented this strategic decision for their students, giving many students of Rhine-Waal University of Applied Sciences the opportunity to complete a qualifying language course and earn credits for their achievement.

Eligibility

It is important to note that students are only eligible to earn credits for a language course if their degree programme or Examination Board (*Prüfungsausschuss*) permits. Thus, students must first refer to their examination regulations, in particular the curricular overview in the annex, to discern whether they are eligible for credits. Here it will be plainly stated whether language courses are included in the programme's elective catalogue or not, and how many credits can be obtained for them (usually 5). The latest versions of examination regulations are found here:

- Faculty of Technology and Bionics
- Faculty of Life Sciences
- Faculty of Society and Economics
- Faculty of Communication and Environment

Students do not need to register for a language course in HIS, but they must register in Moodle. Furthermore, students must make a binding decision as to whether they are taking the course for credits, at the latest during the final examination, and usually inform their instructor at the start of the course.

Obtaining credits in HIS

Students taking a language course for credits must complete all mandatory requirements for their course (see below for details). After the language course concludes, the Languages Department will receive all documentation from the instructor and verify that credit-seeking students have completed all mandatory requirements. A list of these students will then be sent to Examination Services, which is responsible for final verification of eligibility and entering the results into HIS.

Grading for language courses

We use the following grading scale for all language courses. A "4" or better is passing.

Please refer to your <u>examination regulations</u> to determine whether the grade from your language course will count towards your GPA, denoted by the signifier "P", for *Prüfung*. If this is not the case, the course will be treated as an ungraded pass/fail, denoted by "T", for *Testat*.

Learning objectives and skills A1.1 – A2.1 (cont.)	A2.2: The main objective of this module is to continue developing students' communicative skills by expanding and solidifying passive and active vocabularies and strengthening both their understanding and command of grammatical structures appropriate to this level. Upon successful completion of this module, students should be able to navigate many everyday situations using limited means of communication, as well as produce and understand commonly used terms and phrases in German. Continued practice of learning strategies is also a central component of this module.
Contents	Module contents are based on the "can-do" descriptions of the CEFR for the levels A1.1, A1.2, A2.1 and A2.2. Students' four main competency areas (listening, speaking, reading, writing) are expanded and improved through continuous practical repetition: - Dialogues and roleplaying - Phonetic exercises - Reading and discussing short texts - Composing short messages

The development of effective writing skills receives more attention at the B1 level as well. Upon successful completion of this module, students should be able to give short presentations on specific (intercultural) topics and field questions in German from the audience.
	B1.2 : The main objective of this module is providing continuous practice opportunities for students' productive and receptive language skills, with greater focus on fostering autonomous learning skills for future utility. Upon successful completion of this module, students are able to hold presentations in German on a prepared topic and lead an in-depth discussion afterwards.

Learning objectives and skills	This course serves as a practice-oriented bridge between the general proficiency levels of B1 and B2 (CEFR). The target audience is upper-intermediate learners of German who do not (yet) fulfil the prerequisites for a B2-level course and/or require additional practice in the areas of speaking, writing and grammar. Furthermore, the course is designed to expand upon a B1-level foundation with topics and skills that are relevant for internships and professional/work contexts. The focus of this B1+ course is on the practical application of learners' knowledge of German, particularly for speaking and writing tasks. A wide range of topics are covered, including topics designed to prepare students for work in a German-speaking environment. For example: - Writing CVs (Lebensläufe) and cover letters - Preparing for job interviews (simulated conversations) - Everyday language in the workplace (work-relevant vocabulary) - Formulating formal letters - Writing simple reports/minutes/notes - Writing formal emails in workplace contexts
Contents	Module contents are based on the "can-do statements" of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR) for the levels B1/B2.
