Ariel Salleh is an environmental activist and professor of political ecology in Sydney. Her theoretical work draws on activist experience in anti-nuclear politics, biodiversity conservation, and support for women in the

Asia-Pacific region in creating environmentally sustainable community alternatives. Ariel Salleh co-founded the movements against uranium mining in Australia and is a founding member of the Global Sustainability University. Salleh's research examines aspects of social justice and sustainability, including ecofeminism, climate change impacts, and neoliberal green economics.
