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About credit-bearing language courses

With the enactment of the Strategic Development Plan 2017, Rhine-Waal University of Applied Sciences made a collective decision to embed foreign language courses in the curricula of its degree programmes. In the years since, numerous degree programmes have undergone reaccreditation processes and implemented this strategic decision for their students, giving many students of Rhine-Waal University of Applied Sciences the opportunity to complete a qualifying language course and earn credits for their achievement.

Eligibility

It is important to note, however, that students are only eligible to earn credits for a language course if their curriculum allows it. Thus, the first step for students is to refer to their examination regulations, in particular the curricular overview in the annex. Here it will be plainly stated whether language courses are considered permissible elective options for that degree programme. In addition, a degree programme's curriculum will also define the total number of credits which can be earned for a language course (usually only 5). Examination regulations can be found here:

- Faculty of Life Sciences
- Faculty of Society and Economics
- Faculty of Communication and Environment

Please note that other administrative requirements, for example registering in HIS or obtaining permission via special request before completing the course, may be required. Please enquire with your faculty/Examination Board for more information.

Credit-bearing language courses

Only the language courses in this module guide offer credits, as they adhere to the strict workload requirements for ECTS credits (1 credit = approx. **25** hours, thus 5 CP = 150 hours of work). As an international university, we offer a wide range of additional courses in other languages. However, unless otherwise stated, these courses are not currently eligible for recognition, as they do not currently meet the aforementioned requirements for 5 CP.



Recognition process

In order to complete a language course for credit, you must first register in Moodle during an official registration period. Our registration area is found <u>here</u>. In your first session, please indicate to your instructor that you intend to earn credits for the course.

The course syllabi – as well as the module descriptions below – detail all requirements for earning credits. If you successfully complete all requirements with a passing grade (a "4" on the German grading scale), the we will inform Examination Services and your faculty after the course has completed. 5 ECTS will then be credited to your HIS account.

Continuing your learning progression

Naturally, it takes many language courses to reach proficiency.

Thus you can continue learning a language at Rhine-Waal University of Applied Sciences even if you have already received credit for a previous level.
